Spring is a great time to visit Europe; it's just starting to warm up, and the crowds haven't arrived yet. We traveled to the west German spa town of Baden-Baden in April where we rented an apartment for a week and shifted into neutral. Situated at the northern end of the Black Forest, Baden-Baden has been a popular destination for Europe's elite for hundreds of years. Its famous casino provides the adrenaline and its spas the relaxation.

Since they are subsidized by the state, Germany's spas are an incredible bargain. A visit to <u>Friedrichsbad</u> which includes a massage, steam, sauna, and pool runs about

26 Euro. A visit to neighboring <u>CaracallaTherme</u>, built over the original Roman spa dating to 100 AD, costs even less.
