By now you have probably surmised that we are certifiable travel junkies. The tedium of flying notwithstanding, we love visiting places we've never been to and meeting people from other parts of the world. For us, half the fun of traveling is the planning and anticipation of a great trip.

In fact, we've found that the best antidote to post-vacation depression is setting about immediately to plan the next trip. As fellow travel junkies are quick to acknowledge, pre-trip planning not only helps you to be better prepared, it allows you to extend the enjoyment of your travels (<u>link</u>).

Months of planning culminated in a trip to Germany in May 2012 to wander the Märchen Straße (Fairy Tale Route) with our adopted family member Jessica Kalscheuer. The Route passes through several scenic regions in central Germany, including nature parks, towns and cities associated with the Grimm's Fairy Tales of childhood legend. We visited Sleeping Beauty's Castle in Sababurg and Cinderella's Castle in Polle, as well as Hameln, the home of the Pied Piper and the world's largest chocolate rat. There is something magical about towns many hundreds of years old and the hospitality of the German people is also legendary.

In September we traded in our timeshare week for a cruise to Alaska with extended family members Neil and Cherie Umscheid. The amenities on board the Royal Caribbean <u>Radiance of the Seas</u>, with a capacity of 2,600 guests, left nothing to be desired. Our 7-day cruise took us from Vancouver to Seward, Alaska near Anchorage, with stops in Ketchikan, Icy Straight Point, Juneau, Skagway, and Hubbard Glacier. We kayaked on a glacial lake, rode a 1-mile long zip line down a mountain, hiked, biked, and ate more Dungeness crab than we thought was humanly possible.

We've also discovered it's great fun to play tourist in our home town! In December we were thrilled by the <u>Cavalia</u> horse show and <u>John Williams</u> conducting the San Diego Symphony in the performance of his greatest movie hits.

Best Fairytale Town: <u>Steinau am der Strasse</u>, home to the Brothers Grimm. Hamln, home of the Pied Piper, is a close second.

Most Amazing Sight: Löwenburg (Lions Castle), Kassel, Germany. Mendenhall Glacier, Juneau, Alaska.

Most Breathtaking Work of Art: The block prints of <u>Albrecht</u> <u>Dürer</u>, Nuremburg.

Most Unusual: A tie between the <u>Museum of Sepulchral</u> <u>Culture</u> in Kassel and the <u>Baron Von Munchhausen</u> <u>Museum</u> in Bodenwerder. But IMHO, a six-legged rabbit trumps a tricked-out hearse.
